For decades he embodied a Reformed approach to campus ministry that sought to create "a climate to allow searching without fear, and questioning without shame." That's a quote from Don's mentor, Henri Nouwen, who went on to say, "[the campus minister's] faith tells him/her that growth can only take place when belief and unbelief, doubt and faith, hope and despair, can exist together. It is only slowly that a student is willing to realize this, and he/she will never be able to do it unless there is someone to offer him/her a fearless climate." 1

At times it feels that our society is dominated more by fear and shame than by faith. We had a few speakers offer some brief remarks during the open house, and the theme was how we are seeking to carry out that same vision of creating space for the honest wrestling of faith. I shared about a discussion at a recent God @ the Pub gathering. Freshly minted UM PhD and now anthropology faculty member, Ben Hollenbach, talked about how the Chapel has been a place of hospitality and engagement for him. And Chapel Board president, Jen Boes, communicated the board's firm commitment to a posture of Christian welcome and engagement with challenging faith questions.

This is a difficult task in the face of current cultural

and denominational forces. There is a tendency to flatten nuance and seek stark clarity about complex faith issues. That temptation is understandable; life is a lot simpler when there are clear and certain boundaries. Unfortunately (or really, not so unfortunately), Jesus had a habit of transgressing the religious boundaries of his day and posing questions that troubled the received wisdom of religious leaders. That's a calling we embrace as a campus ministry, and it is not something we are willing to sacrifice. Looking back at what God has done informs our vision as we look forward. The God who has been faithful for so many years will continue to guide our ministry into the next years and decades.
